

University at the cross-roads


- Emerged from a tradition of serving the privileged few to become an institution of mass education

Gross enrollment ratio in tertiary education




Total enrollment in tertiary education, regardless of age, expressed as a percentage of the total population of the five-year age group following on from secondary school leaving.



Projections of the share of the population aged 15+ educated to degree level by country




Projections are IIASA Global Education Trends (GET) estimates based on the continuation of current trends.





Reproduction of inequality

- Low social mobility between generations
- Access to universities still correlates largely with income class
- Women gaining access to higher education but not proportionately to academic positions in universities
- Ethnic minority groups grossly under-represented
- Geographic inequality largely reproduced globally




Higher education: achievement Likely to apply to university and likely to get in




Countries that are less equal also have less social mobility
